

As Impeachment Trial Moves On:

Stevenson's Motion Offered

Stevenson's motion was offered in the impeachment trial of President Eisenhower today. The motion was for a continuance of the trial until after the presidential election in November.

The motion was offered by Stevenson's attorney, James C. Arnold. He argued that the trial should be postponed until after the election because the president's actions are being judged by the voters.

The court denied the motion, stating that the impeachment process is a constitutional duty that must be carried out regardless of the election.

Negro Spotlight Operator Claims \$25 Fee Asked For By Police Commissioner

Ozzie (Fats) Newsome, former operator of the Airport Drive-In, a Negro restaurant in Muscle Shoals City, testified today that he was told by Police Commissioner Thomas F. (Cotton) Terry that if he "wanted to operate in Muscle Shoals City" he would have to pay Terry "\$25 a week."

In reply to the proposition, Newsome said he told Terry: "I can't pay that kind of money." Newsome also said Terry threatened to kill him and County Solicitor Murray C. E. Carnahan, Jr. if he "left."

Newsome was one of the more important witnesses called to testify in the impeachment proceedings being conducted this week in Colbert County Circuit Court before Judge H. Neil Taylor and a jury.

Newsome testified that Terry searched his establishment while Terry and his associates were still in there. Terry also said that he had another conversation with Terry in the presence of Mayor Homan and Judge Driggers.
