Now around 19 per cent goes for that purpose. The most recent breakdown in the extension of instalment the extension of instalment credit shows 41 per cent of the outstanding debt is held by com-mercial banks. Sales finance companies have 25 per cent of the total. Credit unions have 11 per cent. Consumer finance companies hold 9 per cent.
