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Warning To Workmen: Many Are Victimized By Foreign Employment Ads

Those with a yen to go far places and make fortune while doing it are warned to be on the alert for "advertisers who purport to be foreign jobs to offer but whose real interest lies in the sale of an alleged directory listing such job."

The Florence Chamber of Commerce said today that, according to information from the National Business Bureau, there has been increasing activity of these "job-bait" services, selling directories for a dollar or two, but masquerading as construction companies seeking to employ an unskilled laborer for high paying jobs overseas.

"They attempt to place their ads in the 'Help Wanted' columns," said a chamber official, "and the jobs sound marvelous. But consumers who really know say that the salaries quoted are twice the actual rates paid and the number of jobs open is highly exaggerated. Furthermore, none of the jobs are open to laborers and unskilled workers. American companies overseas hire natives for such work."

Four other small fires also occurred which firemen extinguished with negligible loss of life. Fire Chief Les Cremonesi said that all of these fires were caused by defective fuses and he cautioned people to make a check and see that their fuses and wires are in good condition during the current cold wave.
