Over the 30-year period covered by the census years 1930 and 1960, manufacturing employment, in the area served by the distributors of TVA power increased about 150 per c.nt, compared with an increase of approximately 75 percent in the Nation, The number of manufacturing firms, has roughly doubled since 1939 both in-the Tennessee Valley region and in the seven states in which the Valley is located. The national increase was about 70 percent.
