said that fertilizer mixers have more

said that fertilizer mixers have more ammonia solution—one source of ni-trogen—than they can use in fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphate, and potash. However, many mixers have superphosphate with which to mix the ammonia solution to make the 19-100 grade. Farmers have no way to distribute liquid fertilizers, so the ammonia solution must be mixed the ammonia solution must be mixed. ammonia solution must be mixed a superphosphate to get it in us-

ADMINISTRATOR'S NOTICE
The 10-10-0 grade should be considered as a source of nitrogen, it was stated. Its use will be mainly as a side dressing material.

The bulletin suggested that if a farmer has some of both 10-10-0 and itrate of soda or ammonia nitrate, be wisely choose on which crops each is to be used. On small grains, rye grass, and mixtures of these and win-ter legumes to be followed by grain sorghum or other crops, 10-10-0 should be used for top dressing. This would leave nitrate of soda or ammonia nitrate for corn and cotton top dress.
