NEGRO CLAIMS RAPE

Officers here are investigating the alleged rape of a 54-year-old Negro woman. Two young white Colbert County farmers were being charged with the crime.
Sheriff Lee McCorkle said the two men, Charles Berryhill, 29, and Herschel Gasque, 27, were arrested on warrants sworn out by Mamie Peterson.

In a signed statement Saturday, the woman stated the men came to her home armed with pistols to collect a debt she owed them. They beat her husband until he was unconscious, she said, and then forced her at gunpoint to go to a neighbor's to try to borrow the money to pay the debt.
When she was unable to get the money, her statement said, the men forced her into their car, drove into the woods and raped her twice.

She stated that she escaped, under threat of death, while the two men were searching for help to pull their car from the mud where it became stalled.

PROFIT FROM BROILERS

Auburn, Ala.—Labor profit of \$134 to \$173 is being made on each 1000 broilers, demonstrators in two Alabama counties have reported to API Extension Service.

Practically all growers used commercial feeds exclusively and these returns were made in spite of very high feed costs, the bulletin said. Records show that volume production was necessary for satisfactory returns.

The range in the labor profit was caused by differences in chick mortality, feeding practices, and market prices.

U. S. Scientists Form Important Blood Research

Although credit for the first work on the sulfonamides was claimed by the German work with penicillin was credited to the English and the Swiss perfected D.D.T. American pharmaceutical scientists have not been idle. Some of the most important research has been done concerning the study of blood and its derivatives by University of Iowa and other United States scientists.

More than 25 years ago the transfusion of blood from one person to another was abandoned because too frequently the patient receiving the blood died after the transfusion. Continued research on blood overcame this difficulty by discovering the four great classes of blood and the method of matching blood from the donor with that of the patient before transfusing.

Later came the discovery that the cells could be removed from the blood and the remaining plasma, the plasma, given to anyone without the necessity of matching. Plasma given this way on the battlefield of World War II overcame the immediate shortage of blood and enabled thousands of soldiers to survive.

Martha's Vineyard Was Early Indian Metropolis

At the time of the Puritan settlement of Boston, Martha's Vineyard apparently was one of the most thickly populated places in the New England area. It is said to have had an Indian population of about 3,000. All belonging to the Wampanoag tribe of the general Algonquian stock. The shores of Martha's Vineyard were exceptionally rich fishing grounds.

Fortunately for the Indians, the island was leased from the Earl of Stirling—to whom it had been granted by the Crown—by a remarkable character, the staunch old Puritan Thomas Mayhew, who had extremely rigid ideas on justice due to Indians. He lived among them, paid well for all their produce and made them his staunch friends. During King Philip's war in 1675-76 he had no hesitation in arming them, and they remained loyal to him. Traces of this friendship recently were found by Smithsonian Institution ethnologists. Samples of their characteristic arrowheads and other implements were found. Descendants of the Indians are still living on the island to revive some of the old handicrafts.

When Byron Was a Swimmer

The historic waterway formed by the Dardanelles (Hellespont) which the English poet Byron is said to have swum across, the Sea of Marmora and the Bosphorus divide Turkey into two land divisions, European and Asiatic Turkey. For the most part European Turkey is an undulating flat country except for the Istranda mountain range facing the Black sea, where the altitude reaches 3,000 feet. The only stream of any importance is the Ergene, a tributary of the Maritza river. Neither of these streams is navigable. Turkey in Asia, or Anatolia as the Turks call it, is bounded by the Black sea, the Dardanelles and the Sea of Marmora, on the north, the Aegean sea on the west. To the south is the Mediterranean sea, Syria and Iraq. On the east Turkey borders Iran and the U.S.S.R. (Russia). Central Anatolia may be described as a series of tablelands varying in altitude from 2,000 feet in the west to 5,000 feet in the east.

Engines Menace to Health

Coal burning steam locomotives constitutes one of the most serious single health menaces in the urban air pollution picture, according to American Medical Association. Death rates from pneumonia, tuberculosis and respiratory cancer provide a clear index of the damage air pollution inflicts on a city's population. All three of these diseases show a marked higher death and incidence rate in badly polluted areas. A recent U. S. public health service survey indicated that about a fourth of the total pollution in the Chicago area is contributed by the coal-burning steam locomotives, but their output of exhaust steam to the air holds the polluting materials suspended easily gives them a first place as a public health menace.

Everglade's Rabbits

One of the most interesting mammals in the Florida Everglades is the swamp rabbit, in size and appearance much like the northern cottontail. Because of the environment, its habits are somewhat different. During the summer the swamps are covered with shallow water seldom more than two or three inches deep, too shallow to drown the smaller animals but enough to keep their feet always wet. The rabbits feed on the submerged ground, but if molested they race for the swamps. When frightened, they make no attempt to avoid water, but dive into the ponds and

WISEST USE FOR NEW FERTILIZER IS GIVEN

Auburn, Ala.—Approval of 10-10-0 as an emergency grade of fertilizer by the State Board of Agriculture will make more nitrogen available to Alabama farmers this year. An explanation of this was given in an API extension bulletin which said that fertilizer mixers have more ammonia solution—one source of nitrogen—than they can use in fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphate, and potash. However, many mixers have superphosphate with which to mix the ammonia solution to make the 10-10-0 grade. Farmers have no way to distribute liquid fertilizers, so the ammonia solution must be mixed with superphosphate to get it in usable form.

The 10-10-0 grade should be considered as a source of nitrogen, it was stated. Its use will be mainly as a side dressing material.

The bulletin suggested that if a farmer has some of both 10-10-0 and nitrate of soda or ammonia nitrate, he wisely choose on which crops each is to be used. On small grains, ryegrass, and mixtures of these and winter legumes to be followed by grain sorghum or other crops, 10-10-0 should be used for top dressing. This would leave nitrate of soda or ammonia nitrate for corn and cotton top dressing.

When 10-10-0 is used to side dress corn or cotton, plan to plant winter legumes or small grains on the area to get best use of phosphate in the fertilizer.
