That meeting would sweep away any doubts as to wail happen in the party convention to be held in Philadelphia. It leaves Southerners who disagree with the president's program no alternative except to organize independently of Northern Democrats and—to be effective—to prepare to withhold their electoral voltes from the party nominee.

Such action would spell certain defeat for the Democratic Party. But if it would bring about a new independent unity in the South the gains in the long run would more than offset limited ate losses. It is not by choice that we are forced into a position of opposing a "civil rights" we oppose. Our light is for the right to manage our own affairs and to preserve our way of life without brughing, if well-meaning interference from the outside. The situation challenges the soundest leadership among us to keep the fight on the high-set possible plane. In it there is a plage neither for crackpot, bigot nor political opportunist.—(Birmingham Post.)
