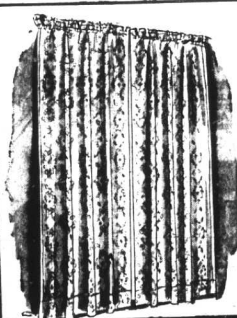

Retail Prices Of Food Change Little In Week

Top Grade Large Eggs Advance Two To Six Cents Dozen

Food shoppers will find only scattered changes in retail prices this week as compared with last week-end when several items tipped downward slightly. Top grade large eggs advanced two to six cents a dozen in many places after declining irregularly for two weeks, but medium and smaller eggs showed little change. Frying and broiling chickens, some coffee, apples, cranberries, Idaho potatoes and strawberries eased a bit in most stores. Meats and bunch carrots were mostly unchanged. At the wholesale level, some small advances in food prices were offset by declines in other commodities. The Dun & Bradstreet wholesale food index held steady this week at 86.48 after dropping for four consecutive weeks. This index represents the sum total of the wholesale cost of a pound each of 31 general use foods. On September 12 when the decline started, the figure was 86.99. A year ago this week it was 85.58. Several brands of coffee, both packages and bagged, were found by independent roasters and food store chains. They said the reductions—first since May—reflected a recent downturn in the cost of green coffee beans. C. A. Swanson & Sons of Omaha, large poultry packer, slashed its wanted broiled chicken prices up to 15 percent in one of the first large scale reductions in wholesaler prices since the Korean war started. The company attributed the cuts to lower farmers' prices on poultry. Agriculture Secretary Brannan, speaking in Cincinnati said an upward price trend in overall food prices is plainly discernible until well into the first quarter of next year. However, the rise will be held to moderate size by the ample supplies of food on hand and by the equally real fact that meat prices are going down, he told a convention of the National Association of Food Chains. Brannan said the nation's excellent food distribution rules out any need for a system of food controls at this time. But he added, "Let me make it perfectly plain that I cannot say at this time that we can go forward for eight months without food controls."

Addressing the same gathering, Herbert R. Kardon, president of Stokely-Van Camp, Inc. of Indianapolis, said that because of anticipated higher costs for labor, growers' products and materials, "1951 will see higher prices for all

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. My son was a doctor in the services and was discharged as a major. He did not receive his education from the government. Is he subject to the doctor draft? A. Technically he is subject to it but he is not likely to be called. Q. Are Army counter-intelligence corps men being called back to active service? A. Yes. Q. Our son had a low number for his GI insurance dividend. He has been called back to the service and his wife needs the money desperately. What should he do? A. Write to the Veterans Administration giving full name, serial number and address. Q. I am in the Naval inactive reserve. When I am about to be drafted will I be able to go on active duty instead? A. They're not drafting Naval reservists. Q. My husband and I are now divorced. I am taking care of our child and he doesn't contribute to our support at all. I believe he is dodging his draft but that he was supporting us. Is it my duty to tell the board the truth? A. This space isn't devoted to advice on what a person's moral duties are. You don't face jail if you keep out of his affairs, however if that's what you're worried about, Q. I have just received orders to

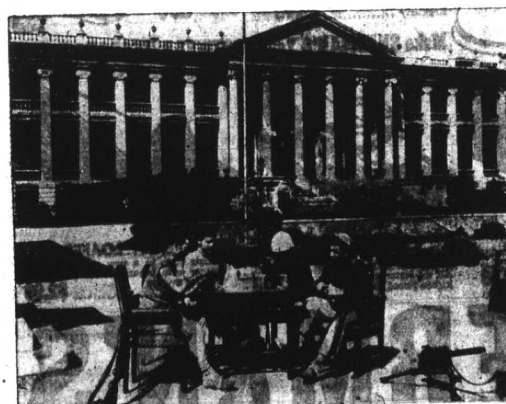
rejoin my unit. I have no objection with a possible call to active duty in the Marine Corps. But I am being treated at a Veterans Administration hospital. Are they liable to take me anyway? A. Report for your exam as ordered and tell the doctor about your illness. He will decide whether or not you will be called. Chances are you won't be.
