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United States Is Trying Get Russia Pay Off Her Debt

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States is trying in renewed fashion to get some cash payment from Soviet Russia on her huge lend-lease debt of gratitude.

The United States estimates it lent-lease supplies worth \$11,000,000,000 (B) to trace Communist Russia against the German invasion in World War Two. There is no thought of getting a settlement of that amount. The U. S. wants Russia to pay for the peacetime value of lend-lease goods and return 106 small naval craft.

In addition, the U. S. wants Russia to pay six American companies for the use of their patents to operate a lend-lease oil refinery.

After yesterday's three and a quarter hour meeting—described as preliminary skimming—it was reported that each side challenged figures presented to the other. John Wiley chief American negotiator reportedly recapitulated American shipments and asked the Russians to pay a fair value for still productive goods.

American officials said they would not guess from the text of the first meeting whether the Russians intend to make a cash settlement or continue putting it off as they have since the end of lend-lease in 1945.

The talks are to resume Wednesday afternoon, when American sources said Russia would be presented with hard figures representing the American estimate of her debt.

Race Riot Breaks Out In Brooklyn School

NEW YORK (AP)—A fist fight between a white boy and a Negro schoolmate spread through a Brooklyn high school cafeteria yesterday involving 1,200 boys and girls in a melee that overturned tables and broke crockery.

Many of the white and Negro students in the Franklin K. Lane high school cafeteria soon were exchanging blows.

A teacher who attempted to restore peace was punched in the eye. Another dispute among students from the school broke out later in the day, and 25 Negro and white boys and girls fought on a subway platform. A Negro patrolman employed by the subway line was punched and kicked when he tried to intervene.

Brooklyn police began to round up a number of students for questioning. Police said there had been trouble at the school since last Friday, when a white boy and a Negro boy had a dispute.
