Review Of Alabama Colbert To Stay 'Dry' **April 1964** 

Industrial production in Alabama during the month of April changed only slightly from March, as the number of series showing month-to-month advances was offset by those which declined. ### Todd Suspends More Foreign Beef

Montgomery, June 17 — Alabama Commissioner of Agriculture A. W Commissioner of Agriculture A. W. Todd began a new assault on contaminated foreign meat imports today, placing 47 cases of imported beef under suspension from sale and movement.

The meat, located at Associated Gro cery Warehouse in Birmingham, was packaged for the Tupman Thurlov packaged for the Tupman Thurlow Company of England and New York and imported from Argentina. Includ-ed in the suspension was 29 cases of corned beef and 18 cases of roast beef and coast beef with gravy, all can-and

The suspension by four represents the first such action by the Commis-sioner since being served with a fed-eral injunction ordering him to 'revamp my methods of inspectin testing of foreign meat imports.

Todd said the suspension action was based on the finding of hair in the meat by his Pure Foods and Drugs Division, "making the beef unwholesome and unfit for human consumption."

## A 15 Year **Test Program**

Completed By TVA

15 year testing and demonstran program no v being concluded by TVA foresters has helped create a new and expanding market for commercially treated wooden fence posts.

Kenneth J Seigworth, Director of TVA's Division of Porestry Development, said that 15 years ago commer-cially treated posts were available by special order only. Today, they can be purchased at almost any farm sup-ply store in the Tennessee Valley," he said, "and sales in the region not total about a quarter million posts each year." TVA's Division of Porestry Develop

He added that with an estimated 100 He added that with an estimated 100 million posts in use on Valley farms, mestly untreated, future requirements should approach one million annually. Three commercial treating plants in the region and sewfral others nearby make treated posts available at reasonable costs.

In the late 1940's, TVA began took In the late 1980's. TVA begin took-ing for an efficient, low-cost method of treating posts to meet the needs of Valley landowners, who were faced with a dividing stipply of naturally durable—fence post woods. At the same time, thousands of acres of non-durable post-size plares and hardwoods were in need of thinning. TVA began testing several promising oil-soluble post-size plares with the initial idea of preservatives, with the initial idea of providing an inexpensive method by which farmers could treat posts them-

To promote the use of treated posts, TVA designed mobile treating equip-ment and demonstrated it to over 13, 660 people throughout the Valley ment and demonstrated it to over 13-460 people throughout -the Valley. While home treatment proved effec-tive, the principal result of the denoi-strations was an increase in the use of commercially treated posts. Results of the TVA program judi-cate that pine posts treated with "gen-

cate (nat pine posts treat with ta" (pentachlorophenol) or copper naphthenate should last at least 20 years. Commercial pressure treated posts will last 30 years or more.

posts will last 30 years or more. "Today, the trend definitely is toward increased reliance on commercial treating plants." Schworth, said. However, he pointed out that abome treating methods for posts and sonstruction lumber may make a significant contribution in under-developed countries. "The Agency for International Development and the Peace Corps may find it a valuable addition to their programs," he said.
