The USSELS, Belgium, June 4.—The King's return, victorious in the royal's parliamentary elections, marked the start of a program to exiled King Leopold III back to the throne. WASHINGTON, June 4.—President Truman signed the bill today which authorizes the use of federal funds to develop backward areas. The measure was signed at the White House ceremony. It authorizes five programs of world-wide aid, including the European Recovery Plan, and a start on the Point Four program to develop backward areas.

"Taken together," Mr. Truman said in a broad, enlightened and typically American enterprise, "they will soon pass a companion bill to take up again his demands for a senatorial convention and a constitutional convention."
