Attorneys To Meet On Phenix Jury Box Issue

BIRMINGHAM—Representatives of the attorney general's office and attorneys in the Albert Patterson murder trial will meet with Judge J. Russell McElroy today at 2 p. m. (CST) to consider a petition seeking to refill the Russell County jury box.

Judge McElroy, who will preside over the murder trials at Phenix City, Feb. 14, said the meeting was at the request of attorneys for Albert Fuller, Arch Ferrell and former Atty. Gen. H. G. Carter, accused of murdering Patterson.

These attorneys are Roderick Beedow, Bob Owen and George Rogers. They are expected to file the petition seeking to refill the Russell County jury box today, and the date for hearing on the petition was expected to be set at the conference this afternoon.

Newly elected Atty. Gen. John Patterson, son of the man nominated for the state's highest legal post, will attend the conference.

Albert Patterson was slain June 11, shortly after he won the Democratic nomination for attorney general. His assassination set off the six-month vice cleanup in Phenix City.
