Diplomat Indicates Reds Will Free Remaining U. S. Prisoners Fairly Soon

WASHINGTON (AP)—U. S. officials informally expressed confidence today that more American fliers held by Communist China will be released in the near future.

Indian diplomat V. K. Krishna Menon has advised the State Department that freeing of four fighter pilots was but the first step planned by the Peiping regime to ease Far East tensions and seek improvement in relations with the United States.

He indicated release of the others could be expected fairly soon. A letter from Chinese Premier Chou En-lai to United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld also raised hopes of early freedom for the remaining 11.

HONG KONG (U. P.)—Four American fliers released by Communist China after more than two years imprisonment reached Hong Kong today. Less than three hours later they took off for Hawaii and their families.

Plan Termed Unconstitutional

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court today directed that public segregation of white and Negro pupils be ended as soon as feasible, taking local conditions into account.

Chief Justice Warren, announcing the court's decision, said lower courts could decide whether a prompt and reasonable start toward full compliance was or was not as early as practicable.

He added that lower courts, sitting as courts of equity, "may properly take into account local school authorities."

Release 'Attempt To Relax Tension'

WASHINGTON (U. P.)—President Eisenhower said today Communist China has implied that it released four imprisoned American airmen in an effort to relax tensions in the Far East.

But the President held a news conference and said the release was to be watched carefully. He cautioned against what he termed any "hit or miss conclusions with respect to the intentions of Red China."
