Negroes To Ask University Admission

BIRMINGHAM (AP)—A federal judge has ruled that the University of Alabama can't refuse enrollment to two Negro women because of their race. Judge Hebert Grooms in his ruling yesterday enjoined Dean of Admissions William Adams from refusing the girls admittance to the university because they are Negro. The action was the first such suit in Alabama since the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that segregation in schools is unconstitutional. MOULTON (Special)—A new federal-state highway providing a direct link between Moulton and Tuscumbia has been approved in Montgomery. Announcement of the new route was made Wednesday afternoon by Charles C. McWhorter, chairman of the Lawrence County Board of Revenue after conferring with State Highway Director Herman Nelson and Lawrence Representatives, W. J. Bill, Lee, in Montgomery. The road will be constructed with a Federal and State funds and the direct route of traffic from the east of Moulton and north of Tuscumbia and Moulton headed for Birmingham and other points south and by-passing Decatur. The road is expected to cut away from the distance between Moulton and Tuscumbia by way of the "T-Club" in the southeastern corner of Lawrence County. Tentative plans call for road to be built north of Moulton, south of Lawrence County, and north of Tuscumbia. The road will be required to be built with a two-lane highway will probably be 22 feet wide.
