"In that time we hope to visit every single home in the county whose occupants signal that they wish to give. We will do our best to see that no one is left out," Mrs. Reeder promised.

"At present, a record number of polio patients are receiving March of Dimes aid in their long and difficult struggle to rebuild lives in their communities."

The Mothers' March started in 1941 and contributions in amount to \$22.46, in 1953-1954 to \$150.
