

Trenholm Hi School Opens August 29

The Trenholm Negro High School will begin its Fall term Aug. 29 at 9 o'clock in a regular teacher institute meeting in the school library. This institute will last for one week and will be concerned with organization and in-service planning and registration.

The registration procedure will be as follows: All first graders will be asked to report Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock. We are asking that you bring with you your health certificate and any other health records that might have to help us adjust your child off to an early start.

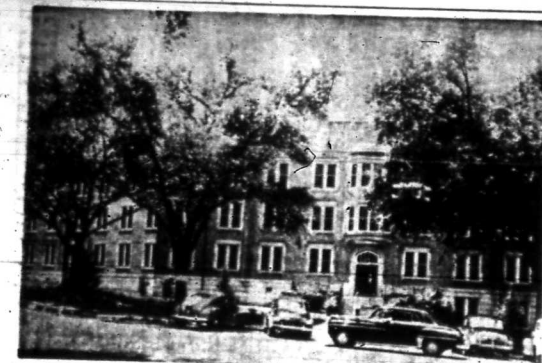
School officials said those families who failed to meet the pre-school clinic on last April should see their family doctor and secure a health statement covering the following: check-ups and other physical weaknesses the child may have or possibly develop. Those who have done this and have corrected the health problems should bring only the birth certificate on Wednesday for registration.

The following grades two-twelve will come to register on Thursday promptly at 8:30 a.m. Grades two through six will report to the regular teachers, while those that are teacher as last year.

Parents who wish for their child the elementary department books will get your class assignment, accordingly book list and thereby your fees should be paid if you select any subject in the following list: algebra, chemistry, physics, biology, general science, typing, home economics or band, but all pupils will be charged a library fee of one dollar. It was explained.

All the local teachers will be back for the ensuing year, timely variations and cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

School Lunch Program Told By Thornton

The school lunch program in Lauderdale County for the 1955-56 and 1956-57 terms was reviewed by Allen Thornton, superintendent. Mr. Thornton stated that during the 1955-56 school term 707,000 meals were served with 1953 for the purpose of certifying to the 21 white and two Negro public schools of Lauderdale County which have the health and sanitation and an expenditure of \$286,075.13 for the year.

During the 1954-55 school term 749,464 school lunches were served to children, an increase over previous year of 42,296 with an expenditure of \$218,118.84—\$29 per child.

State workshops for school lunch personnel have been held at Florence.

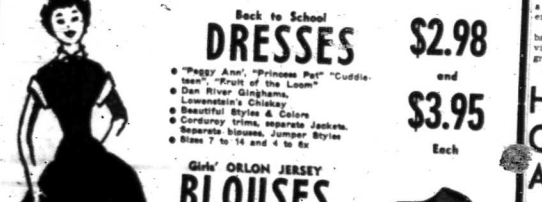
