

Rita Hayworth Walks Out, Dick Can't Believe It

HOLLYWOOD — Rita Hayworth has walked out on her husband, Dick Haymes, in the best interests of their children, Dick said. She explained.

Appointed by reporters of his wife's statement made in her attorney's office—Haymes wrote "I don't believe it."

The Italian-haired film star issued this terse statement yesterday.

"I have separated from Dick because I believe that in the best interests of my children, Dick and myself, it is necessary that both of us have time to think things out. I don't know at this time whether the separation will be final."

The actress looked tired and wan. Her attorney, Maury L. Span, refused the request of photographers that she remove her dark glasses. Nor did he permit her to state a reason for the separation.

She didn't indicate whether she would file suit for divorce from her fourth husband. They were married in Las Vegas.

Haymes, 34, has stood steadfastly by her side during his successful deportation fight and has pleaded income tax troubles.

The government had sought to deport him to his native Argentina on grounds he was an alien illegal in this country.

Reached by telephone, Haymes told a newsmen, "As far as I'm concerned, Rita is just what I'm in love with. That's the only way I can look at it—that the marriage is intact. I'm just waiting for her to come home."

He said he returned to their 1950 home early yesterday from a signing engagement at the Colonial Grove to find Rita and her daughters gone.

He admitted they had had an argument but apparently didn't admit it serious.

A physician friend, Dr. H. Clay Barton, joined the singer by her house through a window of his home.

He said reporters were "in" was in no condition for interview.

"He is so upset, so sad and so hurt about his relations with the press," the doctor said. "He admires his fans and respects his wife very much."

Later by telephone he denied to reporters that he and Rita were divorced. He said he had not approved the statement which he had okayed.

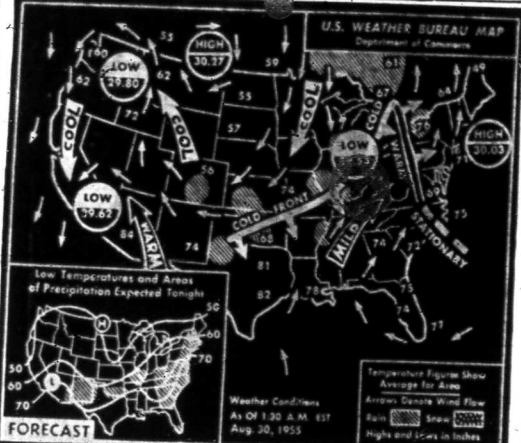

Major Roasters Hike Coffee Prices

NEW YORK (AP) — The nation's two biggest independent coffee roasters raised their wholesale prices today.

General Foods Corp. increased its Maxwell House brand by three cents. Maxwell House added three cents to its prices. Chase Sanborn raised its prices by two cents.

How long it would take to raise prices to 91 cents a pound, trade sources said they expect other roasters to follow suit.

The increase is passed on at the retail level depends to a large extent on the individual grocer's share. Coffee roasters give retailers a 5 to 10 percent discount on the price.

Since late July, Brazilian and Colombian coffee prices have advanced about four cents a pound in New York.
